#### STUDENT PROGRAMS

The primary reason that students are encouraged to attend Country High School is to get them into a habit of attending school. Most of our students are considered habitual truants. The second most predominate reason is to assist students in getting on track for graduation. These students are usually 30 or more credits behind their expected grade level. Students are encouraged to attend school regularly using several strategies. Attendance is tied to progress through our credit system. Regular attendance is the first step toward successful completion of graduation requirements. Students earn 1 semester unit of credit for 80 points earned in the classroom. Typically, 5 points are earned per class period of instruction. Students are expected to earn a minimum of 15 credits per quarter.

If students are frequently absent, the attendance clerk, counselor, teachers, and/or principal may make several phone calls to reach the student and/ or the parents. Students may be placed on a list for home visits by the school principal. Failure to get positive responses results in the initiation of truancy procedures. A first letter of truancy is sent home. If we are unsuccessful in returning the student to school on a regular basis, a second letter of truancy is sent to the family. With each letter, parents are requested to attend a conference. After the third letter, students are referred to the Student Attendance Review Board. Every effort is made to keep all students in school.

The regular academic program at Country High School consists of individualized and group settings that attempt to reach all students. It provides avenues to accommodate and enhance different learning styles.

Country High School's principal and counselor provide an orientation for all incoming students. An in-depth overview of the course offerings, school rules, and steps to succeed at Country High School are presented at this time. All students will be assessed for placement in Math and Language Arts utilizing the STAR computer test and database.

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### **Special Education**

One full-time resource specialist and an aide are available for those students that have active Individual Educational Plans.

#### **Site Council**

It sanctions programs and acts as advisor to the school's administration. The composition of the Site Council consists of parents, students, teachers, counselor, administrator, and other staff. The Site Council meets as often as possible.

#### Nursery

The Country High School nursery provides childcare for students enrolled in the Teen Parent program. A child care hand book is available and given to each teen parent.

### **Police Partnership**

We have a Community Services Officer on campus in addition Social Worker interns and a master social worker supplied by youth services that provide us with counseling support.

### Awards-Back-to-School-Night

Each quarter Country High School has an Awards/Family Night to recognize outstanding student achievement and present awards for honor roll students and students outstanding in individual classes. It is also a time for parents to come and discuss with their student's teacher how well the student is progressing in school.

### Assessment

We have benchmark tests given in English, Social Studies, Science and

Math. The California High School Exit Examination was given in November 2012 and February, March, and May of 2013. The STAR tests are given in April to all students except 4<sup>th</sup> & 5th year students.

#### Advisory

Country High School has a quarterly advisory period where students meet with an assigned staff member to discuss transcripts, attendance, grades, graduation requirements, testing, goal setting strategies, etc.

#### **Student Study Team**

 Country High School has revised and improved its model for a Student Study Team to which staff can refer students of concern. We also monitor, implement, and update student 504 plans. Student study teams are available upon request of the parent, student or teacher as needed when a concern arises regarding a student. The MSAP (Masonic Student Assistance Program) model has been implemented. Staff, parents, and students may refer when they feel they are experiencing a barrier to learning. Assessments, counseling, and class/session changes are available as an outcome from the team's recommendations. This team considers classroom modifications, scheduling modifications, teacher/ parent conferences, and referrals to other agencies.

Three teachers and the site principal have undergone RTI2 training this school year during the past two years.

### **Community Participation**

Staff and students participate in the city's Cultural Diversity Faire. The staff seeks opportunities to involve students in community affairs. Examples include our Student Leadership class helping out at Opportunity House, Peace Jam, Pennies for Patients, KOVR Coat Drive and Vaca FISH. Student Leadership class also invites Solano County blood mobile once each semester on campus and many students and staff participate in giving blood.

### **Youth Roundtable**

Country High School supports the Roundtable Committee and involves students as needed. This group consists of people from various aspects of the community: California State Prison at Solano, schools, businesses, the police department, clergy, hospital employees, state assembly representative, private therapist, newspaper editors, and any others wanting to contribute to the needs of students. This organization assists students with programs and

have actually funded or assisted in funding of student led projects.

# Student Handbook

 The committee reviewed VUSD policies related to school safety, and the policies included in this plan exist in Country High School's student handbook. Our student expectations and consequences are outlined along with different program offerings.

#### **Disaster Plan**

Country High School has a Disaster Plan as a part of its Safe School Plan. There are designations of responsibilities given to the staff. The plan includes emergency provisions for food supplies, water, and communication devises. On October 18, 2012 the entire District participated in a Disaster Drill supported by the Vacaville Police and Fire agencies. On March 21, 2013 we held a Hostile Act Intrusion Drill. During that time our new evacuation procedures which were developed in conjunction with the Vacaville Police Department were put into place.

0 The District and City have in place an emergency plan and new Standard Operating Procedures for Disasters plan that is located in each room. Monthly drills are held where the plan is practiced and put into action. Emergency exit plans are posted beside the exits of each classroom and the teachers go over them before each emergency drill. We have an automated messaging and calling system that is in place and working (Global Connect) that can be used to contact staff, students, and parents regarding emergency situations that occur when school is not in session.

### **Sexual Harassment Policy**

Country High School follows the Vacaville Unified School District policy on harassment.

### **Child Abuse**

Country High School follows state mandates regarding reporting of child abuse to the proper authorities. Guest Speakers and lessons are provided to

the teen parenting and health classes regarding prevention, reporting, and treatment of child abuse.

#### **Police Questioning and Apprehension**

Law enforcement officers have the right to come on campus to interview students as suspects or witnesses. School officials shall not delay, hinder or obstruct law officers from the performance of their duties. We do have a sign-out log for officers to fill out if a student is arrested and removed from campus. We would then immediately notify the district office and parents.

### **Suspension and Expulsion**

 Country High School follows the Vacaville Unified School District policy concerning suspension and expulsion. We have a feature in ARIES that allows for each teacher every Monday to receive an ED Code spread sheet showing suspensions and expulsions. At the beginning of the school year, the staff reviews with the students the school rules. In addition, the principal regularly visits classrooms and emphasizes school rules and conduct expectations. Because we receive new students throughout the year a copy of the rules is found in the student handbook and given to each new student at orientation.

### **Expulsion Hearing Panel**

The Board of Trustees has delegated the conduct of expulsion hearings to an Administrative Panel.

This panel is under the auspices of the Learning Support/Alternative Programs department and it's members underwent training in August of 2010 about student rights and the processes at hearing panel goes through to ensure the process is done fairly and according to the law. Attorney Van Vue provided the training.

### **Discipline**

In order to provide an opportunity for the most effective learning of every student discipline in our schools is essential. The school's discipline procedure is outlined in the student handbook and each new student receives this handbook at their orientation.

#### **School Attendance Review Board**

Students with attendance problems are referred to SARB. Both the Principal and School Counselor sit on the VUSD SARB Board.

### **Search and Seizure**

Country High school follows the Vacaville Unified School district's policy on search and seizure.

#### Unlawful Harassment, Bullying and Hate Crime Reporting

Country High School follows the Vacaville Unified School district policy on unlawful harassment, bullying and hate crime reporting. Teachers and staff are expected to comply with all district policies, education code and other laws regarding these incidents.

#### **Attendance Improvement**

Country High School utilizes innovations to motivate students to improve their attendance; including but not limited to nightly calls home, non-attendance letters being sent home and home visits by school personnel. Students who earn eighteen credits per quarter are awarded off-campus lunch passes for the following quarter. Students who have perfect attendance receive gift cards from local merchants.

### **School Ramps**

At the Muzetta M. Thrower Alternative Educational Center all areas of the school are ADA accessible.

### **Physical Environment**

- The physical environment at the Muzetta M. Thrower Alternative Education Center is conducive to productive learning. The classrooms have been modernized for high school students. We utilize six classrooms in the old Ulatis building as classrooms, one room as the nursery, and one room as the library. We have three new buildings that are used as classrooms as well as an office/conference room building. One portable building is used as a classroom.

### Safe Learning Environment

Country High School is dedicated to maintaining a safe, secure learning environment for all student, staff and community. We received a Safety Grant for \$1000 during the 2011-12 school year. We completely support the district's drug, alcohol, tobacco, and violence free position. Students receive information related to these topics in many classes and are taught by highly-qualified teachers and guest speakers.

The administration and staff use clear disciplinary guidelines and consistent enforcement. The staff is well aware of the discipline policies. In August of each school year the administration conducts classroom visits to review with students the important components to the student handbook. Additionally, at each orientation for incoming new students, the discipline policies are reviewed again.

**Average Daily Attendance:** 91.8% as of April 1, 2013

**Test Results:** Country High School made 5 of 6 AYP criteria and our API was 569 which the highest of any continuation high school in Solano County. The only criterion that was not met was that of the graduation rate which is ironic because we graduated a record 62 students last school year.

California Healthy Kids Survey: 2012-13

The CHKS asks students many questions related to areas of concern relative to student lives. The data from the area of selected Alcohol and Drug use measure highlight the following areas. Several other statistics have been included to illustrate our unique student population. Most of these issues could be considered barriers to attendance.

• 70% of students reported they had been truant during the past thirty days. 31% had been truant 0 times;17% had been truant 1-2

times; 22% had been truant a few times; 6% had been truant once a month; 8% had been truant once a week; and 17% had been truant more than once a week.

- 22% of students had mostly A's and 23% of students had mostly A's & B's while only 4% had mostly F's
- 84% of students said they have used alcohol with 74% having used it four or more times. 86% of students have used marijuana with 77% having used it four or more times.
- 64% of students said they have used alcohol in the past thirty days and 63% of students said they have used marijuana during that time. 2% of students say they have used alcohol twenty or more days during that time period and 33% of students say they have used marijuana twenty or more times in the past thirty days.
- While 80% said they had not used alcohol or marijuana on school property in the past 30 days 20% had. An even bigger concern is that 13% had been drunk or high on school property between three and five times.
- With regard to harassment on campus 15% of students have been harassed or bullied at school because of race, ethnicity, or national origin; 9% because of religion; 6% because of gender; 10% because of sexual orientation; and 7% because of a physical/mental disability.
- In terms of violence and safety at school 55% had never had rumors or lies spread about them, 62% had never had sexual jokes, comments, or gestures made to them, and 70% had never been made fun of because of their looks.
- Considering more physical violence issues: 73% had never been pushed, shoved, or hit, 79% were not afraid of being beaten up, and 69% had not been in a fight at school in the last 12 months.
- 72% of the students said they had not had property stolen or damaged in the last 12 months.
- The goal of our school's staff is to keep student safe. Guns and other weapons should never be on campus for any reason. With regard to weapons on school property 90% said they had never carried a gun on campus, but 6% said that they had two or more times. 78% responded that they had never carried some other type of weapon on campus.
- 86% of the students had never been threatened or injured with a weapon on school property.

- 87% of the students are not affiliated with a gang.
- 73% of the students had never been cyber-bullied
- In the overall student perceived safety of the school 33% felt very safe, 30% felt safe, 28% stated they felt neither safe nor unsafe, 5% felt unsafe and only 4% felt very unsafe.
